Obituary of Boyd Faulconer

Boyd Faulconer (Bo) passed away on Tuesday December 17th at his home in Leesburg Florida from complications with Cystic Fibrosis. He left behind two sons, a daughter, two stepsons and a stepdaughter.

Boyd was born in 1939 in Marked Tree Arkansas, the last of ten children from Wade and Illma Faulconer, a farming family. Having strong Arkansas Roots, he was a huge Razorbacks fan. Boyd graduated from Oran High School in 1957, Oran Mo. He soon moved to Kansas City and worked at a can factory.

He later started a long career with the Kansas City Missouri Police Department. He began patrolling some of the most challenging parts of the city, areas he preferred to work. While working, he went to CMSU and received a Masters in Public Safety in 1975. He later transferred to the Traffic Department for the Police Department and became an expert in Traffic Safety and Accident Reconstruction. He later started a Consulting Service, teaching Traffic Safety and providing testimony as an expert witness. He also won a patent for inventing an inertia measuring device designed to determine how

slick roads where during rain and snow. Boyd moved to Eureka Springs, Arkansas with his wife LaDel. He enjoyed building things, so they bought a run-down dog kennel and transformed it into a beautiful hillside home. He became a contractor and built over 20 houses and also became a realtor where he was in the top 3% for Century 21. Boyd and LaDel also bought and refurbished a famous Motel in Eureka Springs and ran it for a few years. After his wife passed away, he decided to move to Hawthorn Estates in Leesburg Florida. He found many wonderful friends and often mentioned how he loved it there.
