Obituary of Dorothy Wells

Dorothy Spindle Wells, 92, of Leesburg, Florida, died Thursday, May 27, 2010. Born in Christiansburg, Virginia, September 10, 1917, she was a sixth-generation Virginian and the only child of Daniel Hoag Spindle and Linda Bruce Hazelwood. She attended Mary Baldwin College in Staunton, Virginia and received her bachelor's degree from Northwestern University in Evanston, Illinois in 1939, where she was a member of the Gamma Phi Beta sorority. Following college she married Joseph Wells, raised four children and began a teaching career in Evanston. She moved to Leesburg, Florida in 1976 and taught at Dabney Elementary School in Leesburg. Dorothy retired in 1987 but continued to teach second language learners at the Lee Opportunity Center. She became a resident of Lake Port Square in 1993. She is survived by her four sons; Daniel Wells (Lois Dirkse) of Bethlehem, PA, Thomas Wells (Allison McRae) of Buchanan, MI, James Wells (Amy Trubiroha) of Basalt, CO and David Wells (Barbara Love) of Austin, TX. Dorothy had four grandchildren, six step-grandchildren, and three great-grandchildren. .
