“ While home on spring break from the former Glassboro State College (now Rowan University), I sustained a broken nose in a pickup basketball game. This happened at a park in Ocean Township, my hometown, during the second semester of my freshman year.

I was driven the short distance to my home, where my mom immediately took me to Jersey Shore Medical Center.

There I met Dr. Noguera. He immediately put me at ease with soothing words, then gave me a local anesthesia. He took a small hammer and turned around a scalpel, so the blunt end could be placed against the side of my nose. He said to me, "This will not hurt you. You have a clean break. I will put your nose back into place. When I do that, you will hear a popping sound, like a small firecracker going off."

The hammer hit the scalpel, and I had my nose back in its correct place. "You may have black eyes," said Dr. Noguera, "but you will be fine. "

He was right on two counts. I had two black eyes. And I was fine.

I have never forgotten this incident. And I have never forgotten Dr. Noguera's gentle words and expert actions.
