Obituary of Natalie Lozowick

Natalie V. Lozowick was born Natalie Victoria Reich in Newark, New Jersey. She won the Bamberger Prize as the outstanding student in her grammar school. Natalie graduated in the top ten in a class of 320 students from Weequahic High School, where she was voted the most popular girl in the class. The yearbook noted about her: "A mind full of wisdom and a flair for fun makes her well liked by everyone."

As a scholarship student in Rutgers College for Woman, she graduated first in her class as a Mathematics Major. Her class yearbook noted her as: "The kind of eyes the Irish sing about. The natural judge in those after-midnight arguments."

Vicki was recruited by the Prudential Insurance Company, where she worked on special statistical studies. She left the Pru when she married Jules Lozowick on September 11, 1945, when they made that day famous, but it became infamous on September 11, 2001.

She is called Natalie by her family, but Vicki by her friends. As he is both a friend and family, Jules feels he may call her Natalie or Vicki.

Vicki studied art in the Newark Museum of Art for many years; visited art museums all over the United States, Canada and Europe and read many books about art and was considered a good artist and an excellent critic of art.

Vicki gave paintings and sculptures to family and friends, but never entered a contest and was very surprised and overjoyed to win First Prize for her painting Vegetables in the Lake Port Square Art Show in 2009.

Mrs. Lozowick and Jules resided in Roseland, N.J. before moving to the Lake Port Square Independent Living Community in Leesburg, FL in 2009 and they are overjoyed to live in Lake Port Square.

Vicki's brother Howard Reich lives in St. Cloud, Florida and their eleven nephews and nieces live in Florida , New Jersey, Texas & Arizona.
