They had two children the late Martin L. Bogash and daughter, Carol A. Bogash of Arlington, VA Rosalie graduated from the University of Delaware and was a teacher of special needs children, she spoke French, designed and made jewelry. Rosalie was an expert knitter, avid bridge player, gourmet cook, a lover of animals and world traveler, visiting Europe over twenty times. She was a professional woman, working until age 75 as an office manager. Rosalie was on the Board of Trustee's of the Easton, MD Hospital, a volunteer at Fernbank Museum and Dekalb Hospital in Atlanta, GA. With her husband she chaired the North Dorchester Heritage Festival under Governor Theodore McKeldin while living in Hurlock, MD. Rosalie was also a civilian volunteer with the U.S. Army Aircraft Warning Service, a proud member of the Eagles Lodge in Leesburg following in the footsteps of her father a member of the Eagles in Wilmington, Delaware from the 1930's.
